

OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEARNING EACH AND EVERY DAY




Seminars provide unique opportunities for both faculty and students to pursue topics typically not included in a middle school curricula.



EVENING OF INSPIRATION

This event is an opportunity for students who would like additional assistance with their academics. Facilitated by teachers in all subject areas, the students are invited to stay after school, on a Friday, a week before grades close. At the end of the school day, students are welcomed with ice cream sundaes and outdoor, energetic team building activities. At 4:00, students enter the cafeteria and find that all the materials necessary to complete their assignments have been provided. Teachers are there to help and support them in completing missing assignments. At 6:00, everyone takes a break to enjoy a spaghetti supper, followed by finishing as much work as possible. Students who complete work are able to go to the auditorium, where Pixar Short Films are playing.



EVENING OF EXCELLENCE

The event celebrates the exceptional performance of our students over the course of the school year. Students who distinguish themselves during the school year receive recognition in acknowledgement of their hard work and achievement.



Geography Fair

Each year, grade 6 geography students research a country in the world and hold a public exhibition to demonstrate what they have learned. Students learn about the country's physical geography, economy, and culture and invite community members for an evening of geography complete with models, music, dress, and of course, food.



Field Day







Now more than a decade old, "Soul" Source Aquifer is a science writers' retreat traditionally held the first weekend in June. Students in Grades 5, 6, and 7 apply to attend the program by submitting an 800 word essay. The topic is "a time I felt at home in nature". Once students are accepted into the program, they may attend, for their remaining years as middle school students, simply by submitting three pieces of writing produced during the retreat. Hallmarks of the program include presentations by Audubon scientists, hikes through Nickerson State Park, visits to the Crosby mansion and the Whydah Museum, and a Dolphin Fleet whale watch. The essence of the retreat is to develop an understanding of and appreciation for our Chatham Waterways.








Grade 7: Beyond the Bright Sea


This amazing adventure provides the culminating activity, after reading local author Lauren Wolk's book, Beyond the Bright Sea.


Theatre of Social Issues

Rehearsals begin after winter break with performances in the beginning of April.



HUMAN RIGHTS ACADEMY



Our Human Rights Academy is a nonprofit organization. The purpose is to teach youth about human rights, specifically the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and inspire them to become advocates for tolerance and peace. HRA has now grown into a multi-grade movement, including fifth and sixth graders here at MRMS.

HRA hopes to promote teaching human rights education both in the classroom and in nontraditional educational settings. We aim to reach students and faculty from every grade level, with materials provided by the YHRI (Youth for Human Rights International). By teaching human rights throughout the year we hope to spread this message as part of our school identity as global citizens.

Our materials include "The Story of Human Rights Documentary" (timeline) followed by 30 short public service message videos depicting the 30 Articles of the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Our human rights videos and curricula will fill our classrooms and halls with the simple messages of what our human rights are.

MRMS YEARBOOK COMMITTEE

Dedicated yearbook students have been meeting every Monday since the Fall to organize and edit pictures, and build yearbook pages to capture the fin-tastic memories from this school year.



NATIONAL JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY

Membership in the National Junior Honor Society is one of the highest honors that can be awarded to a middle school student. No student is inducted simply because of high academic achievement. 
